

to remember through this worship service, please let pastor Ho Lee know before November 6. You are invited to light the candle for that person and have the time to remember the deceased with other church members during the service.



11/27 is the first Advent Sunday. As you already know, Advent is the time to prepare ourselves for the birth of Jesus as well as the second coming of Jesus. They are Worship, Spiritual Discipline, Mission, and Witness. In November, we will talk about two more ways: Fellowship and Giving. Please pay attention and think about how we apply these ways to our daily lives.




In this advent season, I will begin a new sermon series, "Mary Looks Back to Bethlehem" from Nov. 27th to Christmas Eve. Through this sermon series, I will try to reflect on Jesus' birth, life, and death from the perspective of Mary, the mother of Jesus Christ, who might know Jesus better in person than anyone else in the world. I will design worship services during Advent and Christmas season based on this sermon series. I hope this sermon series and worship services give you some opportunities to reflect on Jesus in a new way and find new meaning of Christmas for your life journey. If you are interested in reflecting on Jesus and Christmas in the eyes of Mary in a deeper way, I strongly recommend the book, "Not a Silent Night," written by Adam Hamilton. The main source of my sermon series and worship services is this book.

I plan to conduct a sermon survey during November. One of my deepest hopes for my sermon is to make the sermon relevant to our church members' lives. However, I do not know what kind of difficulties and life questions our church members have struggled in their daily lives or what they want to learn more through sermon. I need our church members' inputs for making my sermon more relevant to our church members' lives. Thus, I decided to conduct a sermon survey during November. Please check the church narthex and fill out the sermon survey. This will be very helpful for me to prepare the sermon series in 2023 and 2024.

- New Member Class

I gladly share that some people have come to me and shown their interests in joining Covenant UMC as a new member. I think it is appropriate for those people and potential new members in the future to share the procedure to be a new member. If you would like to join the church, you can be a new member through any worship service with a simple new member ritual. However, before being a new member, I strongly recommend having a new member class with me. It is not a requirement, but strongly recommended. This new member class meets 5 or 6 times with me, reading a very short book, named, Methodist Doctrine: The Essentials by Ted A. Campbell. (I will give this book



as a gift) In this new member class, we learn and discuss basic Christian belief and Methodist doctrine in relation to our daily lives. I know it sounds boring and difficult, reminding many of you of the time of dumb catechism in the past. However, actual class is not about having a lecture and memorizing Bible passage. It is more like open discussion regarding Christian belief and actual life. All participants so far have given positive feedback that the conversation and discussion through this class are interesting and very beneficial for their spiritual journey. - Charge Conference

The Charge Conference will be held at the church on Sunday, 12/4 at 5:30 PM. The charge conference is the basic and fundamental governing body of each United Methodist local church as well as the annual meeting of the church to review and evaluate the total mission and ministry of the church. In this meeting, we elect leaders of the church, approve the church budget for 2023, set the compensation for the pastor, report regarding lay preacher and membership. All church council members should join this meeting and all professing members are strongly recommended to join this important meeting and vote for the church. This is also great opportunity for us to welcome our New D.S. Rev. Park Hunter. Please check your calendar the date of charge conference and join the meeting.

- Confirmation

This year, we have four confirmands who are thinking about confirming their faith before God and the congregation and join the church as a professing member. They will go through a one-year confirmation program and then decide whether they will confirm their baptism and become a professing member or not this coming June. This confirmation process is not the personal process, but communal one. This means that the confirmands should be connected with other church members through this process and not only learn about God and the church community, but also experience them vividly through various relationships. In this sense, confirmation should not be done by pastor, mentors, or parents only, but be done by all church members. That is the reason why I had the time to introduce confirmands on 10/23. In December's Newsletter, the confirmands will introduce themselves. Please remember their names and place them in your prayers.

Church Council

October Church Council reports is using a new format, bullet points with questions only and discussion to follow after all reports were given. This will improve and move the meetings along in a more timely manner. Reports are as follows: SS and Youth—see Family Ministries report, request for funds to upgrade SS/Nursery rooms; Trustees—completed projects, ongoing projects and new projects which you can read in the Trustees report; Finance—Financial report given, 2023 budget to streamline the Church's finances; Endowment—Mary Balson gave update on funds available and the change to merge the Finance, Endowment and Memorial committees with representation from each; newly formed Friends of Chegwin update—new name, \$500 budget, with additional funds needed for teacher appreciation, field trips/transportation and replenishment of school supplies; UMM—the men will be hosting a chili luncheon with the Hanging of the Greens; UWF, many activities going on, Pacto de Gracia—one year anniversary 7/9/23, inclusion in Covenant's family worship and the many challenges of this new ministry; Pastor Ho Lee has put out a survey for sermon topic inputs from the congregation, and an updated church directory should be available in January (no pictures, just contact info).

The request for \$2000 for SS/Nursery room upgrades was approved. Narrative budget for 2023 discussed and approved. A charge conference form (2022 Review of Local Church's Life and Ministry was presented to the Church Council committee chairs.

As the holiday season is not too far off, we need to keep in mind the many blessings the Lord has provided us with. In Christ's name, Bill Averbeck, Church Council Chair

Friends of Chegwin

Following months of exploration and discussion Covenant's Fresh Expressions group decided to focus itself on the needs of Chegwin School, an elementary school several blocks from the church. Having been involved with Chegwin School previously, the group was aware of the various needs that existed at the School and wanted to step forward in a variety of ways to help the students and the teachers provide a positive learning environment.

Chegwin School was named after Rose B. Chegwin, former educator, and longtime member of Division Street United Methodist Church, later named Covenant United Methodist Church. In the past some members of Covenant Church attended Chegwin School, and former member Virginia Wegener taught at Chegwin School in the later years of her teaching career.

Chegwin School has 300 students ranging from Pre-K through fifth grade. It is a multi-cultural school that is in the heart of Fond du Lac. The students come from a variety of backgrounds and speak different languages. Fifteen teachers and forty other staff members work together teaching, and training the students, as well as maintaining the building and providing administrative structure.

Fifteen members of Covenant have volunteered their time to work in the Chegwin classrooms. They will read to children, as well as listen to the children read. They will provide classroom support and will be good listeners when needed.

If you would like to join the Friends of Chegwin, you can contact Diane Weider, Denise Retzleff, or Mary Balson. You will be given a background check application to be completed. When you pass the background check, you will be assigned a class to work in.

We look forward to hearing from you and working with you.


Cancelled Stamp Savers
