FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Quest for Renewing a Local Church

What is the Church? A church is not a building or institution. The Church is the body of Christ. A church is a community of believers. Church is an alternative and exemplary society for the current world. Church is the light of the world. However, all these understandings of the Church above are idealistic. The real, local churches are messy because the Church is not only the gathering of saints but also the gathering of sinners. The local churches exist in the middle of society, so they are unwittingly negatively influenced by the world's darkness. Between the ideal Church in heaven and the messy churches on earth, Christians have confused and struggled, yearning for an authentic and genuine community of believers. In these struggles, many sincere and practical Christians wonder how to transform the messy local churches into more mature and actual Body of Christ. As a local pastor who believes in the value of local Churches for the Kingdom of God and has dedicated himself to pastoral ministry, changing local churches into more of God's Church has been the central question that I have pursued for more than a decade. I still do not know the correct answer. However, I found a few essential conditions while searching for the answer. One of them is this: intimate and loving relationship within the church community.



At the Last Supper, right before his death on the cross, Jesus gave the disciples the new commandment: love one another. This new commandment was not for everyone in the world but for the disciples. When we apply this commandment to today, we can see that this new commandment is not for all human beings but for followers of Jesus Christ, that is Church. Then, Jesus confirmed how this new commandment is crucial for the community of believers by saying:

"By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

- John 13:35

After Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension, the disciples became apostles by receiving the Holy Spirit and began church community. Relationships with other believers in this community were deep and intimate to the point that they could confess their deepest secrets and sins to each other. They laughed together and cried together as one body. They became a family bound by the water of baptism, which seemed thicker than blood. It was not surprising that these churches found, grew, and spread continually despite more than 200 years of persecution by the Roman Empire for Christianity.

Let's think about today's local churches, which have this critical condition for authentic gathering of saints. What kind of relationships do we have with other church members? How much do we know and love each other? One thing I discovered and was shocked from the very beginning of my pastoral ministry was the prevalent superficial relationships in churches. Despite being in the same church community for a long time, many church members did not know each other very well, even each other's last name. For many of them, church members were not more than those who joined a religious ritual together occasionally. Indeed, this superficiality is one of the characteristics of our society nowadays. The advances in technology have made the world a small village, led people to move all around the world, and forced them to live with strangers. This fast-paced and complicated society has caused human relationships to be superficial, which has insidiously spread in other local churches, but the relationships we enjoy at Covenant UMC are not shallow.

Compared to other churches, I have witnessed a lot of loving and caring relationships with one another. I am proud of our church community, however, we still have room to grow in our relationships. We need to deepen our relationship to the point that we can share our pain and suffering with an open heart and mind, laugh together, and cry together. We need to develop spiritual companionship in which we can openly talk about our spiritual journey. How can we develop loving and caring relationships in our Church to that depth? I have found that this can be done through small group ministry.

Small Group Ministry



Small Group ministry is when around 12 or fewer believers intentionally gather and practice Christian life deeply together. This is a somewhat vague definition but; even so, I agree with it. This vague definition is because doing Christian life together has been changed according to context. This means the actual form and the way to do small groups varies.

You can form a small group according to stages of life, place of residence, interests, etc. The place of gathering depends on the group. It could be a church building, a member's house, a restaurant, or a café. How a group develops their relationships depends on the group's characteristics.

I have witnessed some groups living Christian life together by reading the Bible or reading spiritual books. Others did it by having a meal, tea, or coffee. Doing missions together would be another way.

Whatever form they take, the primary purpose of small groups is to deepen our relationship with God and each other.

Invitation to Small Group Planning Team!

I explained the small group ministry in this lengthy way to invite all church members to engage in this ministry. I truly believe that this small group ministry is essential to deepen the relationship between church members and revitalize our church community.

I know a few important principles for building up small group ministry in the Church, however, I do not know what way or form would be most appropriate and effective in our Church. Therefore, I want to form a small group ministry planning team during April and start preparing this critical ministry together by reading books and discussing the future of the Church. While reading this long article, if you have an urge to get involved in this ministry in whatever way, do not hesitate to contact me. I plan to have this meeting in the middle or at the end of April.

April Sermon Series: How to Pray

I will continue to talk about how to pray during April. Originally, I planned to deal with this topic during Lent. However, while studying this theme and preaching about it, I realized there are many more things I would like to share about prayer. I hope this sermon series will guide all our church members to a deeper conversation with God, creating prayer movement among them.


Join the Trivia Fun




