July Sermon Services

Compared to the variety of summer events and missions of the church, we do not have a lot of unique rituals and events in the worship services during July. I plan to bring our church members' attention to Jesus' best teaching, "Sermon on the Mount," exploring its depth together by taking this opportunity. It would be beneficial to read the book of Matthew, chapters 5-7, the whole of Matthew, or the four gospels in the Bible along with this sermon series. If you want to explore Jesus' teaching more deeply, I strongly recommend reading two books, "Sermon on the Mount: A Beginner's Guide to the Kingdom of Heaven" (written by Amy-Jill Levine) and "Jesus' Plan for a New World" (written by Richard Rohr.)

Reverend Forrest Wells, a former District Superintendent of the Wisconsin Annual Conference and my mentor, plans to come to our church on July 14th and bring God's message to us. Pastor's Reading Week & Vacation

Pastor Ho Lee will have a "Reading Week" from July 1st (Monday) to 3rd (Wednesday). In this "reading week", the Pastor plans to pay attention to reading books regarding the upcoming sermon series.

The week is beneficial for both the Pastor and the congregation because he can improve the quality of sermons (even make shorter sermons possible!). Plus, he can do more pastoral ministries, such as visitation, church administration, meetings, and missions, by reducing the time for preparing sermons each week.

On Independence Day **July 4th**, the church building will be closed. In the middle of July, **July 15th (Monday) to 16th (Tuesday)**, the Pastor will have a short **summer vacation** to have family time.



Certified Lay Minister: Denise Retzleff

I (Ho Lee) am excited to announce that our church lay leader, Denise Retzleff, completed all the classes and training and became the first certified lay minister at the Wisconsin Annual Conference. You can better understand how to become a certified lay minister by reading Denise's article.

"Denise completed the requirement to serve as a Certified Lay Minister (CLM) and was recognized by the Wisconsin United Methodist Annual Conference on June 8th in Green Bay. A CLM is a certified lay speaker who



has been called and equipped to conduct public worship, care for the congregation, assist in program leadership, preach, lead small groups, establish community outreach, or develop new faith communities. The CLM works with the supervision of a clergyperson. A CLM is not clergy and may not conduct the sacraments of baptism or communion.

She received approval from the District Superintendent and Covenant UM Church Council to enter into the program. She completed four online classes on the topics of worship and preaching, administration, Methodist history, and Wesleyan heritage, congregational care, faith formation, and introduction to The Book of Discipline (the laws and processes by which United Methodists govern themselves). She formed a

Mutual Ministry Team (MMT) that included Pastor Ho Lee, Diane Weider, Mary Balson, Dea Hebel, and Mona Averbeck. They supported her involvement and reacted to assigned lessons and appreciates their feedback, time, and support.

Denise was interviewed and approved by the District Committee on Ordained Ministry, then finally approved by the Conference Board of Laity (CBOL) on March 18th. My role is to be in congregational leadership, working with the Pastor and others for the growth and mission of the United Methodist Church. At this time, some of her involvement is as a member of United Women in Faith, chair of the Worship committee, facilitator of Bible study on Wednesday mornings, serving on the task force to initiate small groups this fall, stewardship committee, lay leader, finance committee, church council, staff parish relations committee, Pacto de Gracia Shepherding team, communion steward, liturgist, live stream team and praying for the church."

I (Ho Lee) have learned from my ten-year pastoral ministry in Wisconsin that the church ministry cannot be successful without active engagement and dedication of church leaders and members. Our denomination, the United Methodist Church, recognized the importance of the laity in the church ministry a long time ago and has tried to find a structural way to encourage the laity's active involvement in every aspect of the church. As a result, they developed three different levels of laity ministry: lay servant, lay speaker, and lay minister. The lay servant is one who completes one basic class and is certified by a congregation to serve a local church. A lay speaker has completed a basic and more than one advanced course and is certified by DCOM (District Committee on Ordained Ministry) to serve and preach to a local church and churches in a district. Lay ministry, which is new to the Wisconsin Annual Conference, is the one that has completed all basic and advanced courses and a year-long intensive course to serve and preach not only to a local church but also to all the churches in an annual conference.

From this basic understanding, you can easily see how much time and effort Denise had invested in serving our church. I believe many of you already recognize her sacrifice and love for the church from her countless engagements in the church ministry. Her somewhat long list of engagements above does not cover all her activities in the church. Recognizing her dedication to the church and celebrating her becoming a certified lay minister on **July 21**st is appropriate. However, recognition and celebration will not be enough. We need to pray and support her to extend her good influence not only on



our church but also on other UMC churches at the annual conference level.

I also want to encourage church members to consider themselves to be lay servants, lay speakers, and lay ministers. I know many church members are searching for a way to make their lives meaningful. How can it be more meaningful than investing your time and effort to build up a healthy church community as a catalyst for the transformation of the world? You might be reluctant to jump in because you lack experience and knowledge. That is why many churches in the Wisconsin Annual Conference provide various training to be equipped for the church ministry. If you are interested in pursuing these laity ministries, do not hesitate to contact me.

TRUSTEES

Your Trustees have worked diligently to maintain your Church and keep it looking good and functionally safe. We have developed a 5-year plan over the last several years. This plan is as follows: parking lot and driveway, carpet/pew upgrade, scrolling outdoor sign and painting outside of Church. At this point, it appears that the parking lot and driveway is the most apparent need at this time. This project has been discussed the last few years, but we had put it on

hold. We believe that this area is the original pavement from when the Church was built in 1988. It has been seal coated several times and the pot holes have been fixed a few times but they always break open, thus, our liability increases due to possible injury not only to our congregation, but to the public.

These projects, along with the money needed to address them will be discussed in the future and the Trustees will continue to engage with the congregation on these projects.

MISSIONARY VISIT

On Tuesday July 23rd, Covenant United Methodist Church will host a United Methodist missionary from the General Board of Global Ministries. Rev. Eliad Dias dos Santos, a native of Brazil, who currently serves the poor through the Methodist Church of Italy, will be visiting

Wisconsin for one week prior to returning to her home in Brazil for a time of respite.

Eliad was ordained in 1990 and served as a pastor in churches in the city of Sao Paulo, Brazil. She participated in international training on conflict resolution, mediation, and human rights protection. But it was working with women prostitutes that converted her. Through that experience Eliad promised God that she would work for people the church doesn't normally take in: prostitutes, street people, transgender people. Eliad believes that as Christians, we are the presence of God in the lives of those people who are excluded, helping them materially, but (also) mainly fighting for a more just world.

Before starting her missionary assignment in Italy. Eliad coordinated a project for migrant women and children in Brazil. Describing her mission call, Eliad said, "I don't worry about what might happen a few years from now. God, who ruled the world before I was born, will take care of me even when I die. My part is to improve the present moment and collaborate for a better future for all people.

Rev. Eliad will be the guest speaker at a 12:00 potluck luncheon to be held at Covenant Church on **July 23rd**. Members of Covenant UMC, as well as persons from Salem UMC – Fond du Lac, Community UMC – North Fond du Lac and Ripon Immanuel are invited to attend.

As always, a sign-up sheet will be available in the Narthex. We want to thank all who help out and a great big thank you to our Youth who also give of their time. Many blessing to you all.



ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Annual Conference was a good one this year. There was definitely less tension, fewer worries, and lowered stress, after years of arguments over human sexuality that ultimately led to disaffiliation -- it was nice to attend a good conference to just breathe deep and relax. No more ugly arguments and no more uncertainty about our future as United Methodists.

The General Conference dealt with three major concerns: Regionalization with 28 paragraphs removed from the Book of Discipline allowing conferences to govern the way that works best for them; Removal of Restrictive Language from the Book of Discipline allowing gay clergy to be commissioned or ordained and stating that marriage is between two consenting adults; and Revised Social Principles looking at equality for all.

We voted on consolidating our districts from five to four. We will now be in the Southeast District. The US is also

going from 39 bishops to 32. We will share a bishop with Northern Illinois. We are not merging conferences, just sharing a bishop.

We have to say good-bye to our Bishop, Hee-Soo Jung. We were fortunate to have him for 12 years (four years longer than normal thanks to COVID). In addition to being a wonderful Bishop, he recruited Pastor Ho Lee to Wisconsin. For that alone, I am grateful. We are still waiting to hear who our new bishop will be. Many are projecting that it will be Dan Schwerin who was assistant to Bishop Jung until he was appointed Bishop to Northern Illinois so he is knowledgeable about both conferences.

We were also able to witness Denise Retzleff being honored as a Certified Lay Ministry. She and her classmate A.J. were the first two people to achieve this in the state of Wisconsin. It is an honor to have Denise as a leader at Covenant.

We supplied 14 dignity kits for the In Gathering at Annual Conference. I believe that at one point in the weekend I saw a sign that said 1400 kits had been donated. Thank you for being a part of it.

Joyce was a trail blazer because the job was originally just for men, but the men wanted to connect directly with customers as salesmen rather than be in the office. So she was hired for this job. There were 200 office employees at the time. She received orders from salesman in the western region of the US. She did whatever was necessary to prepare the ice cream and other dairy product cartons to be printed in the factory.

Joyce met Calvin, her husband-to-be, when she was dancing at the Eagle's Club in Oshkosh. They were married 24 ½ years, and she became a dairy farmer's wife. They have four children – Jeff (in Oklahoma), Patti,


Curt, Steve (in California), 7 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren.

Joyce loves to cook, bake and try new recipes. One of her favorites is poppy seed torte. She shared her joy of cooking with young people as a volunteer 4-H foods leader for many years, and as a foods superintendent at the county fair for 22 years. Other hobbies include games like Scrabble and Dominos, and card games like Sheepshead, Uno and Phase 10.

She has done lots and lots of travel. She's been to all 50 states and to many international destinations. Her favorites were to Egypt to see the pyramids and ride a camel, to Israel to float in the Dead Sea, and to Russia to see a ballet. Other trips took her to Guatemala, Mexico, Brazil, Germany, Australia, New Zealand, the UK and other foreign nations.


INVITATION TO CLASS


