August Sermon and Worship Services

August Sermon Series: "Church on Fire" (Acts 2)

The Book of Acts, chapter 2, is one of the best-known stories for many Christians. On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples and followers of Jesus while they were praying in



an upper room. They were filled with the Holy Spirit, came out of the house, and preached the Gospel in various languages. Many Jews from different regions were amazed and touched by their ability to speak in different tongues, as well as by the good news they shared, which led them to join this new movement. This event marks the beginning of the church. Many of you are likely familiar with this story. Pastors, including

myself, repeatedly share it. The church commemorates this event at least once a year on Pentecost Sunday. This emphasis and repetition highlight how crucial this story is for followers of Jesus Christ.

However, how much do you know about this story beyond what I've explained? There are additional stories that follow, such as Peter's preaching and the life of the early church. Have you taken the time to focus on these accounts? More importantly, what is the relationship between this magnificent story about the beginning of the church and our lives today? What messages does this passage bring to you and to our congregation?


In August, I encourage our church members to explore the familiar story found in Acts chapter 2. Let's dive into its hidden messages and discover the lessons and principles that can deepen our relationship with God. These insights will also help us revitalize our church community.

August Worship Services

The worship services in August will primarily focus on our Sermon Series titled "Church on Fire." However, there are two special worship services that I would like you to take note of. The first is the Church Picnic on **August 10**. On this Sunday, we will hold the worship

Report on Annual Conference

We voted on four **constitutional amendments**, but the results are not shared with us until after all of the Annual Conferences vote on them. **Ballot 1**: Worldwide Regionalization allows United Methodists to best serve their unique communities. Regionalization creates equity across the Church without privileging one region as the center and others as peripheries. **Ballot 2**: Ratification at the postponed 2020 General Conference, the legislative gathering voted to add the words "gender" and "ability" to Paragraph 4, Article IV of The United Methodist Church's Constitution. This amendment affirms that no one should be excluded from membership in the Church for any reason. **Ballot 3**: Racial Justice Proposed changes to The UMC Constitution will strengthen our commitment by explicitly recognizing the church's role in combating racism, racial inequity, colonialism, white privilege, and white supremacy. **Ballot 4**: Paragraph 35 of the UM Constitution It standardizes and clarifies who is eligible to vote for clergy delegates to General Conference. While it does not change eligibility requirements from what is already detailed in other places in the Book of Discipline, it ensures that:

- A Master of Divinity (M. Div.) must be from a University Senate-approved theological school (or equivalent in Central Conferences),
- The language used is more precise and consistent with the rest of the Book of Discipline.
- It creates uniform educational standards for voting clergy across the global church, avoiding confusion or unequal application of qualifications.

Budget Highlights

2024 Results:

- * 210 local churches paid 100% of their 2024 apportionments
- * All past Conference audits are now complete and are available on the Conference web site
- * 2024 budget: gross apportionments \$6,920,500; net apportionments \$5,674,810 (82.0%)
- * We received donations to more than 100 programs totaling over \$1.1 million (e.g. UMCOR, World Hunger and Poverty, US Disaster Response, Bread for the World, Rooted and Rising, Annual Conference Ingathering)

2026 budget proposal:

- * About 25% of our budget is pre-determined by GCFA.
- * Budget detail on Pages 26-38 of Pre-Conference Workbook.
- * Apportionments anticipated at 81%
- * Use \$951,000 from Foundation designated/restricted accounts as allowed
- * Renting some space in Conference Center as source of income
- * DS/staff salaries increase at 2%
- * Medical insurance assumed to increase at 9.0%

Bishop Schwerin's State of The Church Address

In his State of the Church Address, Bishop Schwerin reflected on the feeling of rootlessness many experience today, contrasting it with the rootedness the Church once represented. Drawing on the story from Acts 27, where Paul and the centurion Julius faced a storm at sea, he asked, "What good is Eucharist in a storm?" and reminded us: we are the body of Christ *in* the storm. Leaders are called to name the moment we're in, listen for the Spirit, and point toward the shore ahead. He emphasized the importance of a renewed focus—the annual conference's mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world—through efforts like leadership cohorts, MCCI, ICD, Fresh Expressions, and partnerships with Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary. He encouraged experimentation, innovation, and reading *How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going* by Susan Beaumont.

The new UMC vision statement—forming disciples who "love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously"—calls us beyond our buildings and into our communities. Bishop Schwerin noted financial pressures like rising insurance costs and the loss of full-time appointments, especially in smaller congregations, challenging us to creatively adapt. Reminding us that early Methodists loved people, not institutions, he affirmed that faith is "the courage that allows grace to do its work." Finally, he spoke to our moral calling: the Gospel compels us to care for the vulnerable, affirm the sacred worth of all people, and stand against racism and exclusion. "This is a sanctuary moment," he said, calling for clarity and conviction in our resistance through love, and urging us to listen deeply to our vocations.

Church Council Meeting Highlights on June 30, 2025


- The church council was informed by Bill Averbeck, chair of the trustees, that the repaying of the church parking lot will begin the week of July 21. Bill said the church parking lot will be closed for that entire weeks, and will be re-opened on Augst 10th. It was also reported that a combination of contributions and gifts of \$22,900.00 has been donated for the parking lot project. Thank you to all who have contributed to the project.
- Another item discussed was the church's financial budget is down \$4000.00 from last year's income at this time. We needed to transfer \$5,000.00 from the bequest funds to the general funds to cover current and future expenses.
- Church council has approved the purchase of five (5) tablets for homebound members to watch our Sunday Church Service from home.
- Church council has approved the catering of our church picnic on August 10th.
- Church council approved the purchase of 11 storage shelves and totes to organize the church classrooms on the 1st and 3rd floor, and four (4) shelves and totes for organizing the Heritage room.
- Church council would like to thank Jan Andrews for her many years of being a money counter and we would like to also **thank Bill Dekker** for volunteering to take Jan's place.
- We set the date for our next Church Council meeting for August 25 at 6:30 pm. Anyone wanting to attend these meetings is more than welcome.

Banana project article

For the Ark banana project, you're in. The banana project for the 2024-2025 school year. Totals are as follows. 392 cases, including the 2 cases a week I provided to the Evans School. It comes to a total of 1 of 15,280 pounds at 39 cents a pound. And that came to \$5,959.20. This includes 4

cases a week for 3 weeks to summer school and almost 2000 boxes of cereal whenever the store had a good sale. United Methodist Men in November spent \$760 on socks and undies, etc. For at least 4 schools, Riverside, Chegwin, Pier, and Parkside schools. \$480 for 188 pairs a winter gloves from an anonymous donor. \$600 to Parkside for the fourth-grade field trip to the Milwaukee Public Museum. \$500 to our youth mission trip to Kentucky, plus \$184 from the candy bar sale and \$664 from the Pizza sale. Our men's group is involved wherever needed, plus to make donations our



coupons to the banana project for the 2025-2026 school year. This is needed in our community. Please earmark donations for the bananas to the banana project.


