From Pastor's Desk:

- Advent, Isaiah, and Advent Wreath Candles

The Advent season is just around the corner. By the time you receive this newsletter and read this article, we will likely already be in Advent. Advent is an essential Christian season—a time to prepare for and wait not only for the birth of Jesus at Christmas but also for Christ's second coming. It reminds us

that we live in the space “between the two.” Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas, on November 30 this year, and ends on Christmas Eve.



Many people think Advent is simply a countdown to Christmas, but it is more than that. Advent marks the beginning of a new year in the Christian calendar. Our spiritual ancestors believed the best way to begin the Christian year was by reflecting on the beginning of Jesus' life. Advent invites us today to look back on our lives in

2025 and look forward to 2026 with renewed faith, following the baby Jesus who comes to us again.

As I prayed and prepared for this meaningful season, I decided to focus on two themes: **Isaiah** and the **Advent Wreath**. Since ancient times, the church has followed a set of readings—what we now call the lectionary—that covers the breadth of Scripture over a three-year cycle. According to this tradition, one book consistently appears in the Advent readings: **Isaiah**.

Why Isaiah? Our spiritual forefathers believed that Isaiah helps clarify the meaning of Jesus' coming. Isaiah called the people of Israel to repentance and offered hope through the promise of a coming Messiah and the Kingdom of God. Early Christians firmly believed that this promised Messiah was Jesus Christ, and that through him God's Kingdom draws near to us. This ancient hope—from the Old Testament through the New—deepens our understanding of the true meaning of Christmas.

In contrast to the long history of the lectionary, the Advent wreath is a more recent tradition, beginning in the 19th century. Its four candles represent **hope, peace, joy, and love**. I have always appreciated this tradition, but I often wondered why these four themes were chosen. As I studied the Advent lectionary and especially the Isaiah passages, I realized how closely these themes align with the Scriptures read during this season. It seems Christians drew these themes from the biblical texts, shaping the Advent wreath we use today.

With these traditions in mind—and seeing how strongly Isaiah connects with the wreath's four themes—I chose to preach an Advent sermon series this year



called “Isaiah’s Christmas.” Through this series, we will explore Christmas hope, peace, joy, and love through the lens of the prophet Isaiah.

I invite you to join us in worship this Advent season with holy expectation. May God use this time to deepen your understanding of Christ’s coming and renew your heart for the year ahead.

December Worship and Sermon

To glorify God and help our church family experience the living Jesus throughout the Christmas season, our church has prepared a series of inspiring and meaningful worship services. Please mark your calendars and join us as we journey through Advent together.

♦ November 30 – 1st Sunday of Advent

This Sunday marks the beginning of a new Christian year. We will light **the Candle of Hope** and explore the true meaning of Christmas hope through the prophet Isaiah. It will be a joyful morning as we enter the Christmas season with beautiful decorations, carols, and traditions—and as we welcome **five new members**: *Gary, Laurel, Penny, Lauren, and Katie*.

♦ December 7 – 2nd Sunday of Advent / Communion Sunday

On the second Sunday of Advent, we will light **the Candle of Peace** and reflect on the deep biblical meaning of peace through our Isaiah sermon series. In keeping with our church tradition, we will also celebrate **Holy Communion** under the theme of Advent.

♦ December 14 – 3rd Sunday of Advent / Children’s Christmas Program

Our children and youth will lead worship on this joyful Sunday! After more than a month of preparation, they will present their Christmas program based on the **Gospel of Luke**, including **Christmas songs, dance, a children’s handbell choir, a puppet show, and the nativity story**. This is always a highlight of the season—please come and support our young disciples.

♦ December 21 – 4th Sunday of Advent

On the final Sunday of Advent, we will light **the Candle of Love** and reflect on the deeper meaning of love through Isaiah and Matthew. Both the **Bell Choir** and **Chancel Choir** will offer music during worship. After the service, **from 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM**, we will go **Christmas caroling** at local assisted living facilities and visit our homebound church members.

♦ December 24 – Christmas Eve Candlelight Service at 6:30 PM



Join us for our traditional and beloved **Christmas Eve Candlelight Service at 6:30 PM**. Through music offered by our choir and several gifted church members, we will celebrate the birth of Jesus. We will read from the Gospel of Luke and light all the Advent candles, including the **Christ Candle**. The service will conclude with the candlelight ritual and the singing of *Silent Night, Holy Night*. Please invite your friends and family—Christmas Eve is one of the most meaningful times to welcome people back into the life of the church.

♦ December 28 – 1st Sunday After Christmas

The Christmas season continues! On this Sunday, we will reflect on **Christmas joy**, symbolized by

the pink candle, through Isaiah's proclamation. This final worship service of the year will help guide your heart and mind toward God's direction for the coming year, **2026**.

The event, in it's 24th year, features animated light displays, a 100-foot-tall tree, sculptured scenes, and 120 decorated trees on the EAA grounds.

Trillium will be hosting a motor tour of the display on **Thursday December 4**. Have supper at home but leave room for something sweet. **Gather inside at church at 6 p.m.** and enjoy sweet treats and warm drinks. The History of Christmas: Tracing the Journey from Ancient Rome to Modern Festivities

Ancient Rome: Saturnalia and Its Festivities

Long before Christmas, ancient Romans celebrated Saturnalia, honoring Saturn, the god of agriculture and time. Beginning on December 17, the festival included feasting, merrymaking, gift-giving, and even a reversal of social roles. Homes and temples were decorated with greenery, candles symbolizing the returning sun, and public banquets filled the streets. This joyful season helped shape many customs later connected to Christmas.

The Birth of Christmas

The early Christians did not initially celebrate Christmas. The birth of Jesus Christ is not mentioned as a holiday in the Bible, and the actual date remains a subject of debate. It was only in the fourth century AD, under the rule of Emperor Constantine, that December 25th was officially designated as the date to celebrate Christ's birth. This date was likely chosen to align with existing Roman festivities, making it easier for pagan converts to adopt Christianity without giving up their beloved winter celebrations.

Transformation of Traditions

As Christianity spread throughout Europe, many pagan customs were absorbed and transformed. The use of evergreen trees and holly, the lighting of candles, and the exchange of gifts all have roots in pagan winter celebrations. The spirit of generosity and hope for renewal—qualities central to Saturnalia—became integral to Christmas as well.

Over centuries, Christmas evolved, blending religious and secular elements. In medieval times, it was celebrated with great feasts, music, and communal gatherings. The holiday continued to absorb local customs as it traveled across different lands, resulting in the diverse traditions we observe today.

Conclusion

The history of Christmas is a tapestry woven from strands of pagan ritual and Christian belief. From the lively festivities of Saturnalia to the solemn commemoration of Christ's birth, the holiday has always been a time of joy, goodwill, and celebration. Understanding its origins in Roman paganism not only enriches our appreciation of Christmas but also reveals how cultures shape and reshape their traditions, creating new meanings for each generation.

Missions

Tis the Season! On **December 7th** and **14th** the loose offering will go towards **food gift cards** for the six families we have adopted. Rather than collecting food from the congregation for the families, we thought it would be better for the families to choose their own.

December 21st and **28th** the loose offering will go to **apportionments**. Apportionments help fund our annual conference employees, programs, and missions worldwide.

Our loose offering on **Christmas Eve** and our **Christmas envelopes** will be split between **the Warming Shelter** and the **church's general fund**. The Warming Shelter is open November through April and houses up to 36 people a night. It provides a meal, a hot shower, laundry, and a bed.

Angel Tree/Gifts for Families

Every year we sponsor families in need from Chegwin Elementary School and Pacto de Gracia. This year we are sponsoring **six families** and that **requires 67 gifts**. You can find the **Angel Tree in the fellowship hall**. It is adorned with ornaments that have gift suggestions on them. You pull the tags for the gifts you would like to purchase, find the correct family form on the table, and sign out your ornaments. You will wrap the presents (please include gift receipts if possible), attach the tags/ornaments, and return them by Sunday, December 14th. Just place them under the tree, and then on the forms you signed them out, sign them returned. If you aren't a shopper, see Diane for other options. In addition to the gifts, each family receives a gift card for food and a laundry basket filled with cleaning supplies. There is a lot of gratitude from these families each year.
